Pink Shirt Day on Friday - read our Workplace Free from Unwelcome or...

Ahead of Pink Shirt Day on Friday, now is a good time to familiarise yourself with our Workplace Free from Unwelcome or Inappropriate Behaviour policy.

The policy outlines our LINZ commitment to freeing our workplaces from unwelcome or inappropriate behaviour. Our approach is based on encouraging early intervention. This means matters are dealt with early before they escalate or become a sustained pattern of behaviour that requires more formal action to resolve.

What is unwelcome and inappropriate behaviour?

Unwelcome and inappropriate behaviour is an umbrella term for:

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- harassment (of any kind)
- discrimination (of any kind)
- bullying (behaviour that meets the definition of bullying)
- violence of any kind
- any other form of unwelcome or inappropriate behaviour.

People may have differing views on what is or is not unwelcome or inappropriate; and that's ok. The aim is to create an inclusive culture, where we are aware of and sensitive to our individual differences.

Where can I get support?

Where and how you seek support may depend on both the behaviour and who you feel comfortable talking to. Options include:

- speaking to your leader in the first instance
- seeking advice and/or assistance from your <u>HR Business Partner</u> (/sites/about-us/SitePages/Human-Resources.aspx)
- getting support through our <u>Employee Assistance Programme</u>
