Response to your official information request

Thank you for your official information request received on 27 February 2024 for:

- a list of the work undertaken on the ex-Defence land on Watts Peninsula pursuant to the 2019 budget statement assigning LINZ \$4 million and 4 years to undertake remedial work on this land prior to handing it over to DOC;
- b) a list of work remaining to be done before the transfer can take place;
- c) the amount of the \$4 million currently unspent.

As you may be aware, Toitū Te Whenua Land Information New Zealand (LINZ) is working closely with the Department of Conservation (DOC), Te Arawhiti, and the Port Nicholson Block Settlement Trust (PNBST) on future arrangements for the site. As the land is within the rohe of Taranaki Whānui ki Te Upoko o Te Ika (Taranaki Whānui) it's important their aspirations for the area are properly considered.

This iwi-Crown working group is considering options that will ensure the historical, cultural and ecological significance of the land is recognised and protected. Advice on agreed options will be provided to Ministers for consideration in the coming months.

While these future arrangements are being considered, LINZ is focused on managing the land on behalf of the Crown.

Work undertaken

LINZ has completed the following works at Watts Peninsula:

- Site hazard assessments, including a structural assessment, a geo-hazard assessment, a hazardous building materials survey, an arboricultural safety assessment, and a ground contamination assessment.
- An archaeological assessment.

- A Heritage Values Assessment detailing the value of heritage and cultural features across the entire site.
- Seismic assessments of structures to guide future repairs and management.
- Review of a cultural safety audit provided by Taranaki Whānui.
- Removed dangerous trees, overhanging dead wood, large stacks of logs and site maintenance activities.
- Repaired Mag Road to improve safety and stormwater runoff, with further repairs planned following storm damage in June and August 2022.
- 3D laser scanning of Fort Ballance to inform seismic assessments and create a record.
- Designed retaining wall where a slip occurred to protect the track to Massey Memorial from further erosion.

Work planned

LINZ has the following hazard management work planned:

- Clearing overgrown vegetation around structures to enable further inspections and access for asbestos removal works.
- Removing hazardous materials including asbestos from Mag Road WWII-era magazine buildings.
- Undertaking access track and stormwater improvement works on Mag Road.
- Building a retaining wall to manage slip risks on the Massey Track.

Funding

Through Budget 2019, LINZ received \$4 million in funding to maintain and improve the safety of the land. Approximately \$1.7 million is available to be used for the planned works listed above.
