- <u>Te Aro</u> (suburb) NZ Gazette, 21 June 2019, 2019-In2814

(Karori, Mākara, Mākara Beach, Ōwhiro Bay and Te Aro were part of the NZGB's ongoing project to standardise and make official significant Māori place names).

The suburb and locality names you've advised are no longer in use can continue to be classified as recorded unofficial names with their feature type altered to 'Place' in the Gazetteer, so that they're still discoverable.

As Hataitai and Paparangi have issues with spelling they will stay as the unofficial recorded names of the suburbs.

WCC would need to make a <u>full proposal</u> to the NZGB to alter Seatoun Bays to Karaka Bays, and Lambton to Wellington Central.

Horokiwi (locality), Moa Point (suburb), Pipitea (suburb), Takapu Valley (locality), aren't recorded place names in the <u>Gazetteer</u>. However, one of our team is checking historic NZMS maps to see if they're shown on them.

Finally, are you able to provide me with the shape files of WCC's suburb and localities' boundaries that are shown on WCC's GIS map please?

Attached is the list we received from the NZ Geographic Board (the "Board"). The only change I have made to the attached list, is that I have changed the font colour to red for ones that the Board has said "WCC confirmed as Suburb".

All the red 39 names are included in the list of 57 names that WCC approved in 2003 (and most were first approved decades earlier). It seems that the Geographic Board are happy to accept all of these. Our 57 names are currently being used for all correspondence from Council relating to properties. The names are all on the list currently being used by all emergency services, NZ Post, Quotable Value, etc. When the 57 names were approved Council in 2003, the Council consulted with the Board but the Board had no jurisdiction for naming suburbs. Since 2003, legislation has changed and now all new suburb names require Board approval.

Wellington City currently has 57 suburb names that were all on the list that was formally approved by Council in 2003. I think the consultation for the 2003 decision, started in 2002, but at present I have no access to see the review files, so some of my comments below, are from memory. No new suburbs have been created since 2003. This means there are another 18 names in addition to the 39 on the attachment. Do we ask the Board to include all 57 on their list for approval at their next meeting? If the Council wants to review any name in the future, the Council's naming policy and the Boards procedures, do allow a review, but it is not a simple process and would need to include public consultation. The process for getting names on their list for the first time, is a simplified process for including names that are already in common usage. Which of the 57 names, can I ask the Board to include in their official list at their next meeting?

Wellington City has divided the whole city into administration areas that it calls suburbs. There are no gaps or overlaps. The suburb boundaries are defined exactly and are displayed in our published GIS maps. I recognize that the Board, and some other organisations, say that suburbs are areas in urban areas and localities are equivalent areas in rural areas. This means that some areas we called suburbs, the Board may want to list as localities. This does not matter as every address will be associated to either a suburb or locality of Wellington.

After extensive consultation with iwi and the public in 2003, several suburb names changed to names that iwi felt were more appropriate. Some suggested changes were seen as too contentious, but making several changes, was seen as a good compromise. For example, Crawford became Maupuia, Seatoun Bays became Karaka Bays, Happy Valley became Owhiro Bay, Part of Thorndon became Pipitea, part of Kelburn and Booklyn became Aro Valley, part of Miramar became Moa Point.

Below, I have listed the 18 additional names -

- 1. Hataitai This was named after the company that developed most of the sections in the suburb. Some suggest it should be Whataitai and others say the name Whataitai has a stronger connection to the Miramar peninsular. Changing the spelling would have a significant impact on company names, the school, many property addresses, etc. After extensive consultation in 2003, Councillors decided not to make a change at that stage, but they wanted to improve the understanding of the meaning of "Whataitai" and though this should be done by other ways, rather than changing the spelling of the suburb, ie better signage with explanations, on the walkway from sea to sky.
- 2. Horokiwi Board may want to regard this as a locality. This is OK.
- 3. Kaiwharawhara
- 4. Karaka Bays Note, this area was called Seatoun Bays until the 2003 Suburb Review. The change was made after extensive consultation, including with iwi.
- 5. Karori
- 6. Makara Board may want to regard this as a locality. This is OK.
- 7. Makara Beach Board may want to regard this as a locality. This is OK.

- 8. Moa Point Board list only shows this as a geographic feature. Before 2003, it was part of Miramar. It is not a large area but physically separate from Miramar and Emergency Services strongly recommended that it be a separate suburb, so any emergency response was not sent to Miramar.
- 9. Ngauranga
- 10. Ohariu Board may want to regard this as a locality. This is OK.
- 11. Owhiro Bay This area was called Happy Valley until 2003.
- 12. Paparangi After iwi consultation, this name was accepted in 2003. Now there is debate about what spelling is correct.
- 13. Pipitea This area was part of Thorndon until 2003. In 2003, iwi strongly recommended the re-introduction of the name Pipitea. Residential owners in Thorndon opposed a change, but both iwi and residents accepted a compromise that said the commercial and government areas should be separate from Thorndon and called Pipitea. The name Pipitea is now well accepted.
- 14. Takapu Valley Board may want to regard this as a locality. This is OK.
- 15. Tawa Board list says "WCC requested change to Suburb" rather than being treated as a separate Town. This is correct. The Community Board wanted Tawa recognized as a suburb of Wellington, rather than recognizing areas like Redwood as a suburb and risk losing the name Tawa completely.
- 16. Te Aro
- 17. Wellington Central Before 2003, the Council referred to this area as Lambton. However, most people called it Wellington Central, so this name was accepted by Council, in 2003.
- 18. Woodridge.

James was going to speak to Barbara, to get guidance on how she wants us to consult with Councilors and the public.

I have been stalling for time but according to last email from Geographic Board, there will be no more time extensions. They will make decisions and I expect they will say that WCC was invited to make submissions and did not.

Initially, I was going to send the Board a list of all our suburb names, as approved by Council in 2003. I could say that about 3 of the 50, might be contentious and the rest are in common usage and they should be added to their formally approved list. ie, ones like Hataitai could be left off the official list as some suggest it should be Whataitai or something else. However, in recent months, I have heard some Councilors saying that many suburb names should be changed and some would suggest they all should be Maori names. I was not prepared to make a recommendation to the Board, after I realized many Councilors may not agree.

The easiest option would be if Barbara tells the Councilors that Council Officers need to tell the Geographic Board, which names we think are not contentious, so they can be made official. I think that Council currently has more important things to do, rather than look for work and risk up-setting residents who generally are accepting what we have and are not asking for change. Significantly less than 1% of residents are showing signs of wanting change. In 2003, Council unanimously approved all the current names, after we did extensive public consultation.

Next option is to have a workshop with Councilors, to see if the majority of them can agree on which names can be currently accepted. Maybe this could be done by sending them all a list of all our current names and if more than half of them do not agree with any particular name, then that name could be left for review later and not formally approved now. I accept that some Councilors may be reluctant to comment without consulting with residents.

Next option, is do full consultation with the public and present findings to Council, who can then make recommendations to Board. This is similar to what was done in 2003. It is very time consuming and expensive. We have to recognize that views on the use of Maori names have changed since 2003.

The Board's email suggests that if necessary, a name can be changed later if a mistake is made, but the Boards processes show that getting a change later, is significantly more complex than adding names now.

We often receive requests for changes to street names and suburb names. With Barbara's approval, I would like to be able to tell applicants that changes create confusion, they are expensive to arrange and can be very upsetting for some people in the area. When most residents want a change because of current confusion for emergency services, etc, the request should be considered. In other cases, when there is no evidence of majority support, the request should be politely declined as not being a current priority.

In addition to the links you mentioned, we also have https://wellington.govt.nz/about-wellington/maps/print-maps, where there is the section for Wellington Suburbs. The 'Overview of all suburbs' is available there, but also detailed maps of all suburbs, so anyone can see the exact location of the suburb boundaries in relation to property boundaries. It is only pdf's but not everyone has the software to use data from an open data portal, so the pdf's are an alternative that is easy to use by everyone.

There is also Wellington Maps https://gis.wcc.govt.nz/LocalMaps/Gallery/, which will work for any web access and allows users to zoom in and see the exact location of any suburb boundary.

This week, our City Strategy Committee meet to consider a new Naming Policy. They made some minor changes and it will now go to a full Council meeting for adoption. Having heard the discussion at the Committee Meeting, it seems likely that the Councillors may want to review some of the suburb names that they formally approved in 2003. Is it sufficient evidence, if we prove that the names are recorded for all properties within the suburb, on the District Valuation Roll and the Rates Records? We can also show for all of them, that the names have been shown on the Roll and Rates Records for at least 15 years. Should the one near Tawa be discontinued?

We are still looking at how we will add macrons to names that should have them. Our current systems are not compatible, so it is not clear yet, how this will be done. I would prefer macrons to be optional until we have a way to record them.

If a place name is official with a macron, use of the macron can't be optional. However, until your systems are updated you may use the proviso in section 32(2) of the NZGB Act
