Photo I: Looking south from the north eastern corner of Run Block across the expansive plateau rise. These tall grasslands are continuous and unvarying with those in the adjoining Te Papanui Conservation Area.

Photo 8: Steep, regenerating face above the Tuapeka This vegetation pattern is repeated on the faces between spot heights 363m asl. and 287m asl.



Photo 9: Top section of the Youngs Valley wetland and two regenerating gullies. The bladed fenceline at the right marks northern boundary of the Home Block.
