

MAP OF THE COLONY OF NEW ZEALAND;

FROM OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS.

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The original of this map, published by John Arrowsmith of London and ordered by the House of Commons to be printed on May 11 1841 by Hansard Printers is held in the Alexander Turnbull Library, Wellington. John Arrowsmith, born in 1790, worked with the family firm of leading British map producers (built up by his uncle, Aaron Arrowsmith), from 1810 until 1823 when he started on his own account. After the death of his cousin Samuel he participated actively in the firm again until 1861, thereafter continuing to revise earlier work. In all, including revisions, he produced well over four hundred maps, concentrating his efforts mainly on perfecting his London Atlas and producing up-to-date maps, in particular those of Australia and South Africa.

This map of New Zealand was originally reproduced from an engraving of overall size 650mm x 520mm and was published with the British Parliamentary papers "Correspondence respecting the Colonization of New Zealand".

It was compiled from various documents available at that time and was one of the first detailed maps of New Zealand.

Although 1976 is the Centennial year of the Department of Lands and Survey, surveying and mapping in New Zealand dates back to the appointment of the first Surveyor-General, Felton Mathew, to New Zealand on January 1 1840. The selection of this map for reprinting is therefore considered to be particularly appropriate.

This map has been reproduced in this form to commemorate the Department of Lands and Survey's Centennial on 1 May 1976.
